Through our inability to forgive and serve other members of your body, we break your heart. Through our self-indulgent willingness to ignore your justice, loving kindness, and calling to trust and obedience, we participate in your crucifixion. Our abuse of your pride and joy, your lovely creation, is blasphemy. Lord, forgive us, heal us, and transform us into ministers of reconciliation. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
