A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

"Give Thanks With a Grateful Heart"



November is regarded as the month for offering thanks. We do this at Thanksgiving, one of the biggest holidays of the year when families and friends come together. Thanksgiving celebrates the harvest and other blessings of the year.

November is also typically the month when Giving Tuesday occurs. In the United States GivingTuesday is the Tuesday after Thanksgiving yet it has grown into a year-round global movement. This movement has inspired hundreds of millions of people to give, collaborate, and celebrate generosity, unleashing the power of people and organizations to transform their communities and the world.

In just one year, the holiday that occurs on the Tuesday after Thanksgiving helped nonprofits like churches raise \$1.97 billion.

We also incorporate giving thanks and the offering of gratitude as a routine part of worship.

As we get caught up in the routines of daily living, it can be easy to take things for granted. When we face difficulties or challenges, we may instead complain or bemoan our circumstances. However, gratitude is a powerful tool that can help us navigate life's challenges and appreciate the good moments we experience.

The Bible mentions the word "gratitude" (χάριτι and other variations in Greek) 157 times. The Hebrew words for "thanks" and "thanksgiving" occur 72 times. The Bible is full of examples of people who lived with gratitude. Their stories can inspire us to be more grateful than we might otherwise tend to be. Let's explore some of those examples to learn why living with gratitude is an essential expression of our faith.

# Who Showed Gratitude in the Bible?

From the unnamed leper to Job who lost everything, several believers were grateful to God in all circumstances – even challenging ones. Here are a few examples of gratitude that we can learn from:

\* Daniel: King Darius threatened Daniel because he didn't want to worship the pagan gods. Still, Daniel gave thanks and worshipped God endlessly. When thrown into the lion's den, God heard his prayer and protected him. Daniel came out of the den glorifying and thanking Him. (Daniel 6:1-10)

\* Hannah: Hannah was one of the two wives of Ephraim, and the other wife constantly taunted her as she was barren. She cried out to God in prayer, and, because of her faith, God gave her Samuel. Hannah responded with great thanksgiving, acknowledging that her son was from God. (1 Samuel 1:1-28)

\* Job: Job lost everything, including his children, possessions, and health. Despite complete loss, Job decided that God was bigger than his struggles and responded with humility and gratitude. Because of this, God blessed Job with more than he had before. (Job 1:1-22)

\* The leper: Jesus was on His way to Jerusalem when He met ten people with leprosy. In love and power, He miraculously healed all ten lepers. However, only one returned praising God, throwing himself at Jesus' feet and offering thanks. (Luke 17:11-19)

\* The sinful woman: Jesus was eating with Pharisees when a "sinful" woman showed up, brought a precious alabaster jar of expensive perfume, kissed Jesus' feet, and washed them with her hair and perfume. She showed an act of worship and gratitude to Jesus, and He forgave her sins in response. (Luke 7:36-50)

\* Paul: Paul used to persecute Christians. After a dramatic encounter on the road to Damascus, he became humble and changed to promote the Christian faith. He was beaten, shipwrecked, and thrown in prison. Yet, he remained grateful to God who redeemed his life. (Philippians 4:11-12)



Gratitude in the Bible means "extending favor towards," the offering of grace and kindness as a response to something received. It involves more than saying thanks. In the Greek "χάριτι" refers to showing appreciation and returning kindness. This is in contrast to Merriam-Webster's definition of "gratitude," which is more of thankfulness for a personal benefit, such as being "thankful" for something that happens to us.

Biblical gratitude is the willingness to act upon our feelings of gratitude. It is realizing that God is working in our lives come what may, and showing gratitude in how we live. Gratitude sustains us and offers strength.

"Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:16-17)
